Through our work, we inspire and connect people to take their first steps in creating a peaceful, just and sustainable society. Personal transformation, trustbuilding, ethical leadership, and sustainable living are cornerstones of our work. We believe that practising honesty, unselfishness, love and purity of intent will help us 'be the change we want to see in the world'.

In 2021-22, lofCA has stepped intrepidly onto the pathways of healing and reconciliation. Through our Trustbuilding program, we developed engaging Truth-telling and Deep Listening workshops and national education forums. We recognise the importance of bringing together likeminded organisations to share skill sets and further the scope of our impact.

Through our work, we believe we are awakening the conscience of Australia, speaking to this country's greatest needs.














Life Matters Workshops

Ethical leadership

Life Matters is a three-day residential, experiential workshop which takes participants out of their normal busy schedule to a safe space where they can reflect on their own lives and how they can bring positive change in the world.

The workshop draws on the life learning of people from a range of backgrounds with extensive experience as change makers.

A Life Matters workshop took place over the long weekend of 11-14 March with 15 participants. The Victorian Multicultural Commission funded four young Burmese refugees to attend in order to help them better integrate with the wider community and also to develop their leadership potential. The keynote speaker at the workshop was Desh Balasubramanian, Founder and CEO of Ondru, a Melbourne-based non-profit humanitarian organisation working towards a more connected, compassionate and equitable society. Desh challenged everyone present to think beyond their comfort zones and find how they could contribute to this vision, in ways large or small.

One of the young Burmese from the Karen community reported back a month after the course that she was a completely different person after Life Matters. All participants reported that they would or very likely recommend Life Matters to a friend, with several describing it as "life-changing". Much support to the program was given by previous participants of Life Matters, including facilitating sessions and small groups, and logistical support. Their contributions helped create the atmosphere of care and positive engagement in the world that Life Matters fosters: the idea that "everyone can be a change-maker".

Creators of Peace

Release Peace, by Jean Brown

Creators of Peace, started in 1991 as a global women's initiative inspired by lofC, recognises that peace is held hostage by humanity's fears and unresolved conflicts. CoP seeks to release peace!

The whole process and experience was profoundly moving. So much learning, solidarity and connectedness

We do this through our programs, primarily the Creators of Peace Circles, which aim to 'empower, transform and engage women in peace creation'. The type of empowerment we suggest results from the liberation of the heart from the multiple negatives that block our energy and creativity to care effectively. The empowerment that flows from this liberation leads to transformation. and women finding their voice. This transformation of personality and purpose can enable an authentic engagement with creating peace in the world around us. Despite the challenges of COVID over the past few years, the Creators of Peace Australia (CoPA) community was able to create spaces together, online and in person, to discuss and empower peace for both individuals and communities. After traditionally only offering Peace Circles as

in-person gatherings, the move to online Peace Circles was an important transition for the CoPA community – it provided a welcoming space for people from interstate and internationally to connect during that uniquely isolating period. Across the country, three online Peace Circles and two in-person Peace Circles were held, including one in partnership with University of Sydney's Department of Peace and Conflict Studies.

In NSW, the Creators of Peace Community of Practice continued to gather in person and online to discuss 'Peace in Practice'. Peace-focused gatherings are a feature in the CoPA community and have been held in several places around Australia as well as online over the past year. These included local network gatherings as well as spontaneous offerings to keep the CoPA community connected – such

as picnics, and online weekly guided meditation sessions which began in response to the COVID lockdowns and still continue. CoPA women in South Australia held their second annual retreat in 2021 – a time to strengthen their bonds and keep the spirit of deep listening and inner resilience alive.

Over nine months, a CoPA Outreach Team in NSW collaborated with Rosemary Kariuki (Australia Day 2021 Local Hero, 2022 OAM) and African Women's Group to organise a Cultural Exchange Reunion in May 2021. The three-day celebration attended by 180 guests gave Creators of Peace women a greater insight into Rosemary's long-standing and joyful work with newly arrived migrant women, and the opportunity to promote Peace Circles and form new friendships.

In September 2021 CoPA was one of many presenters at the 11-day online Raising Peace Festival. CoPA facilitators ran a two-hour session on *The Power of a Creators of Peace Circle* for 60 attendees. That initial collaboration has led to an ongoing connection with the festival planning committee and an invitation to take part in the 2022 event.

With COVID restrictions limiting the opportunity for people to get together in person, in June 2021 CoPA initiated an online monthly Speakers series inviting a wide range of inspiring people to talk to the CoPA community, including First Nations elder Kelvin Brown speaking about creating a First Nations Knowledge Space, and Patricia Garcia from the Institute of Economics and Peace discussing What is positive Peace?

Trustbuilding Program

The initial focus in the Trustbuilding program has been to build relationships of trust between First Peoples and non-Indigenous Australians through a process of 'truthtelling, truth-hearing' and deep listening.

A broad range of issues with multiple perspectives across the country has been explored to uncover the many layers of our problem statement, to break the "Great Australian silence" around the ongoing impacts of colonisation on First Peoples.

The intention of this quarter was to focus on targeted local initiatives in Melbourne and help establish Armagh as a centre for excellence in Reconciliation, Healing and Values Education in Australia. The Trustbuilding program was recognised by the then Minister of Indigenous Australians, Hon Ken Wyatt MP and Local Federal Member for Higgins Dr Katie Allen MP, who visited Armagh in February.

Existing ties with Thomas Mayo, a signatory to the Uluru Statement from the Heart, were strengthened with a community leader yarning circle in February. Through our Trustbuilding initiatives in March, Uncle Shane Charles, our Cultural Integrity Leader, was introduced to world leading sustainability environmental film maker Damon Gameau, and Sustainable Architecture Forum Chair and Winner of Women in Sustainability, Nadine Samaha.

In April, the Turruk program attracted intercultural, intergenerational, and multisector changemakers, committed to deepening their connection with First Nations leaders. A key component of Turruk was the transfer of knowledge, which was eloquently modelled between Uncle Shane Charles and his nephew Dylan Charles. Dylan has been identified as an emerging cultural leader by his elders. He has personally noted the need to expand his opportunities beyond the country town he grew up in, three hours north of Melbourne.

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion



Since its beginnings Initiatives of Change has pioneered being a diverse and inclusive movement bridging divides of race, religion, politics, culture, and class.

Discover the Other is a workshop which draws on this heritage and unpacks lofC's unique methodology to engage constructively with people who think and see things differently, leading to diverse, inclusive and effective teamwork and partnerships.

The workshop explores how to relate to each other in ways that deepen all of us and build trust. It is a great workshop for anyone who is interacting with people who are culturally or socially different from themselves or who think and act differently. It develops listening skills, better self-awareness, relationships, teamwork and communication skills, and helps build more trust and better discernment.

This course takes a uniquely deep dive into the challenges and benefits of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.

Topics include:

- Who is the 'Other'? awareness of the different dimensions of diversity: cultural, gender, sexuality, age, and how to help diverse people feel accepted and welcome
- What are the internal and external barriers to greater engagement?
- Deep listening skills
- Our unconscious biases and assumptions
- Skills for fast-tracking trust and good will
- The role of emotions in teams and communities
- Strategies for effectively managing conflict
- The role of integrity and values-centred relationships

When applied, these skills and learnings lead to:

- Greater creativity and problem solving
- Higher engagement and satisfaction of all stakeholders
- Improvements to the organisation's brand values
- Higher employee retention
- Higher productivity and revenues
- Reduced stress
- Less time and resources lost in conflict

Didgeridoo Healing

The Trustbuilding Project builds our collective capacity to listen. We create opportunities for *Truth Hearing and Truth Telling* about past and present injustices, as the basis for new understanding. We apply shared principles and values in places where trust has been broken.

Through Trustbuilding Projects, Initiatives of Change Australia is working in partnership with First Nations leaders to build relationships of trust and respect between First Nations and communities in Australia.

The Trustbuilding Project works in partnership with First Nations partners, including Uncle Shane Charles, a Yorta Yorta, Wurundjeri and Boon Wurrung man, First Nations community leader and educator, and Co-Chair of Reconciliation Victoria.

As part of our Trustbuilding Project Uncle Shane Charles offers a unique experience for participants to learn from his Yorta Yorta culture through immersion into storytelling and receiving vibrational healing through the soundwaves of the didgeridoo.

The didgeridoo is one of the oldest most recognisable musical instruments on the planet, founded by the First Peoples of Australia. It has a sacred side that also evokes emotion.

Through playing and hearing, it is a powerful tool that lifts an individual's vibration back to a less chaotic and natural rhythm.

The broad range of harmonic sounds produced by the didgeridoo vibrate in an ancient and universal tone and can be used as sound therapy or a sound healing tool that affects a person on all levels.

A unique cultural experience in the heart of Melbourne.

Women's Yarning Circle: Deep listening to Aboriginal women in leadership

We were honoured to welcome Tracey Evans, a Gunditjmara-Bundjalung woman and an Executive Director of the First Peoples Assembly of Victoria, to Armagh for a Yarning Circle for women. Participation was limited to enable participants to form meaningful connections with each other.



Coranderrk: Healing Ourselves and Country

The lofCA Trustbuilding team went to Coranderrk to learn more about how we can support First Peoples in acknowledging the truth of our shared history, and work together for justice and healing in Australia.

Film screening: In My Blood It Runs

Uncle Shane presented on Zoom a yarn with us about the present realities for First Nations youth, represented in the film *In My Blood It Runs*. He was joined by Leela Gray, an Indigenous Studies student and community activist from Melbourne's western suburbs, who contributed a youth perspective.



A session with Thomas Mayo on the Uluru Statement

Thomas updated us from Darwin on the national campaign, and introduced his new book Dear Son: Letters and Reflections from First Nations Fathers and Sons.

Forum with Yingiya Mark Guyula MLA

Over 90 people joined on Zoom to hear Yingiya Mark Guyula talk on treaty, self-determination and Yolŋu Rom Ŋurruŋu. Yingiya is the only First Nations Independent Member of the Northern Territory Legislative Assembly.



Creative You! - Gala Creative Entertainment Night

A night of drama, film, art, stories, poems and music where creativity was well celebrated.

Exploring themes of opportunity, change and deep listening, Creative You! told the story of the gift of Armagh, the community that developed, and its outreach.





Charity Fundraising Art Auction - Painted stories: Women of the Central Australian Desert

This event provided a foundation for engagement with First Nations culture as well as an opportunity to embrace the vibrancy of First Nations art. Learning about First Peoples' histories and cultures provides an opportunity to develop respect for diversity and an understanding of cultural difference.



Federal Minister visit to Armagh

Federal Minister for Indigenous Australians Hon Ken Wyatt MP, and local Federal MP Dr Katie Allen visited Armagh, the Australia-Pacific Centre for Initiatives of Change.

Community thought-leaders and action-makers from local councils and Indigenous and multicultural organisations joined a deep listening circle organised by IofCA with signatory and advocate for the Uluru Statement from the Heart, Thomas Mayo. Tracing the timeline of the statement, Thomas spoke of the key steps so far and the crucial next steps needed for Voice to be enshrined in the national Constitution.

The same evening Thomas joined a Zoom audience to share news on the Uluru Statement from the Heart and next steps for the Voice.
