Turruk Launched

Turruk - Trustbuilding through truth telling and truth hearing, an IofCA workshop series under the Trustbuilding project was launched on Friday 8 October with a virtual smoking ceremony led by Uncle Shane



Charles, a proud Yorta Yorta, Wurundjeri and Boon Wurrung man, and Cultural Integrity Lead at IofCA. <u>The series</u> consists of eight immersive workshop modules, co-designed with First Nations community elders and knowledge holders. The workshop modules have, so far, brought together between 50 and 70 participants connecting online across the country, and will continue until 19 November.

Sending a big shout out to *Uncle Shane Charles* for the courage in

his truth telling, with such heartfelt wisdom. The sessions on 8 October were complemented by the extraordinary inspiring stories of *Ron Lawler* and of Aunty Marge Tucker, led by *Marg Hepworth*, who walk the talk as First Nation allies.

On 22 October Meriam woman *Alana Marsh* led us on an embodied *Wayapa Wuurrk* practice. This primed us for the deep dive into the difficult dialogues around power and privilege structures led by Wiradjuri community elder *Uncle Glenn*, who introduced us to the concept of *decoloniality*. With much anticipation, *Margaret Hepworth* pioneered her Collaborative Debating methodology online, on the topic of 'changing the date of Australia day.' This was followed by discovering the wonders of each other through challenging conversations, with some tools of everyday neuroscience with *Shoshana Faire*.

Forum with Thomas Mayor

More than 100 people gathered on Zoom on 7 September to hear Thomas Mayor, signatory and advocate for the *Uluru Statement from the Heart*, speak. Thomas outlined where we are now with the Uluru Statement of the Heart campaign for a constitutionally-enshrined First Nations Voice to Parliament.

Women's yarning circle led by Tracey Evans, First Peoples Assembly

An online women's yarning circle was held on 14 September with a group of diverse, intercultural, intergenerational, multi-sector collection of women.

The circle started with a Welcome to Country by N'arweet Dr Carolyn Briggs. The Circle was also an opportunity to honour Aboriginal elder and early activist Aunty Marge Tucker's legacy and the 25 year anniversary of her passing. Participants were encouraged to light a candle in her honour.



Tracey Evans led the circle with a personal recount of her journey to be a member of the First Peoples Assembly and guided our understanding of the Yoo-rrook Commision, truth telling and treaty process in Victoria.



Forum with Yingiya Mark Guyula MLA

Over 90 people joined on Zoom on 28 September to hear Yingiya Mark Guyula talk on treaty, self-determination and Yolnu Rom Durrunu. Yingiya is the only First Nations Independent member of the Northern Territory Legislative Assembly.

Farewells

We bid fond farewells to **Delia Paul** and **Daya Bhagwandas** as they resign from their roles of Communications Manager and IofCA Board member respectively. We wish them all the best for the future.

Delia Paul leaves her mark as Communications Manager

On 30 September, Delia Paul resigned after six years as Communications Manager of lofC Australia, to devote herself to finishing her PhD at Monash University.

Delia brought to the role years of journalistic experience with a Malaysian newspaper and with the Mekong River Commission in Cambodia. Moving to Melbourne with her family, she started as a consultant to lofC Australia while continuing her contract of reporting on major UN conferences in various parts of the world, covering agendas such as the Sustainable Development Goals and Climate Change.

She brought that perspective to lofC Australia, seeking to reposition lofC as a community-based peace building network – building up live, active reporting on the website and a wealth of stories of individual trustbuilding initiatives, retooling interpretation of lofC for contemporary audiences engaged in personal and social transformation.

In 2015, IofC Australia was undergoing its Cultural & Structural Change process – and Delia instituted the monthly Members Memo for internal communications and managed the rebuilding of its database for a growing network. In 2017 she transformed *Newsbriefs* to a digital publication and trained a number of volunteer writers, while launching a research project to document 60 years of IofC/MRA history in Australia. Delia then instituted the weekly What's On, with Parveen Muhammed, which keeps us all updated with how we can best participate in IofCA.

Those who worked with her knew her professional integrity, care and respect for those she worked with, and vision for the maturity and outreach of lofC Australia in its mission of trustbuilding and transformation. She leaves a legacy we can build on, yet have to work to maintain.

A new Communications Manager has been appointed and we will welcome her to the position soon.

Daya Bhagwandas retires as a director of the lofCA board

As Daya Bhagwandas wrote in her resignation letter in August, for over six years she has had the 'privilege of serving the Board of IofC Australia at a time of significant change and transformation.' That she has done, with great dedication, passion and application. We thank her.

She joined, in 2015, when lofC Australia was in the thick of its Cultural and Structural Change process – expanding its membership, clarifying its goals, formalising transparent and accountable decision-making and management, transitioning its governance from a Council of Management to a Board of Directors. Daya was a proactive contributor in this process: setting up the first steps in strategic planning, driving a reform agenda through the Nominations and Performance Committee of the Board, and planning with great energy a 'Pathways' process for the development and integration of new lofC volunteers.

Daya did not always agree with her fellow directors, and was frank in sharing her insights. Yet no-one was left in any doubt about her commitment and integrity as she passionately put forward her analysis and convictions. Her spiritual depth was, and remains, a powerful witness.

Since first meeting lofC at Caux, Switzerland in 1985, Daya has contributed consistently in international forums and conferences of lofC, including serving on the coordinating team for the annual lofC Hub forums during the last two years.

With her international awareness and care for people and spiritual depth, we trust Daya's participation will enrich and sustain the combined efforts of the IofC movement in many situations.

Special Wishes - Honouring and Celebrating a Centenary Birthday!

It is not very often that we get the chance to wish someone a happy 100th birthday! We are thrilled to send our very warm birthday wishes to *Ted Holmes* who turns a century on 9 November.

Ted is currently a regular member of the IofCA Thursday group in Melbourne, and maintains rigour with technology, writing and internet skills, and attends and participates at Zoom meetings. Ted is a committed follower of the IofC

vision and penned these words for us;

'On 9 November 2021 I begin Day 1 of my second century! Like every other day as one seeks to live in the present moment, it requires a new start.

In December 1936 my elder brother Bruce, having met the Oxford Group's challenge of absolute honesty, apologised to me for "pinching" sweets from my drawer in a shared chest of drawers. I loved his beautiful Spirit; his sharing triggered the beginning of a lifetime of interest and preoccupation with MRA (as Initiatives of Change was known as previously). I continued to be a keen reader of MRA literature, especially the speeches of Frank Buchman which were published under the title of *Remaking the World*. My commitment in MRA to remake the world progressively led to a transformation in all aspects of my life, including my professional work in the University and State sectors. I have had the honour of lecturing at the Institutes of Finance and Economics of the Education Department in the People's Republic of China in Wuhan and Laoning, and visiting the Institute of Economic Strategies in Moscow Russia.



When a daughter died in childbirth in April 1997 and my wife 12 weeks later, I turned to poetry for solace. In six years I published and sold copies of four books of selected poems. In February 2015 I was one of 20 poets invited by the Director of the National War Memorial to read poems on the occasion of its War and Words program. Mine was titled *Anzac Cove*.

Since 2014 my life has been in a state of transition as faculties, skill, capacities and energy decline and memories fade, while deeper insights and understanding of realty emerge. As I age, I find life simpler especially when one lives in the light of God's vision for creation - that everything be united in Christ's love - and lived in accordance with Christ's two great commandments - love and service of God and love of neighbour "as I have loved you"; both are valuable as litmus tests for the rectitude of human conduct.'


Finding my peace: Sahba Clara

GET INVOLVED

COVID Protocols for Events

As per the directions from the Department of Health and Human Services, the following protocols are in place for all in person events at Armagh and other venues used for IofCA events in Victoria and NSW.

Any person entering Armagh is required to show one of the following:

- Proof of double vaccinations by checking in through the Services Victoria App and presenting to an appointed Covid Marshal OR
- · A valid medical exemption.

The following density requirements will apply from 29 October to 24 November.

· One person per four square metres.

Restrictions are expected to ease on 24 November, with no density limits in place. As restrictions change, we aim to keep you regularly updated.
